

Numbat Interpretation for Dryandra

Project Numbat recently funded and developed new interpretive signage for Dryandra Woodland which provides visitors with information about the endangered Numbat.

The two signs were installed in June at the Old Mill Dam, a popular starting point for walking trails. The signs include information on what a Numbat looks like, what its yearly activity patterns are, the threats it faces and the work being done to assist its recovery.

Thank you to the Department of Environment and Conservation for finalising the design and installation.

Our annual radio-collar fundraiser is on again. Each year, wild or captive born Numbats are fitted with radio collars each year by the Department of Environment and Conservation to track their movements, gain important information on their dispersal in their habitat and their survival.

For a \$250 donation you can be a part of it by contributing to the cost of the radio-collars. You will receive a certificate with a photo of the collared Numbat, its name, date of birth (if known), sex, weight and location.

Cost: \$30 for adults, \$15 for children for accommodation. Barna Mia costs \$14 per adult and \$7.50 for under 16s (only 14 places available).

What to bring: Food and drinks (enough for at least one breakfast, lunch and BBQ dinner), bedding and warm clothes.
