

We are so grateful for all the local artists and wildlife photographers contributing their work to our Project Numbat 2016 Calendar. But it's not only local artists that get inspired by the beauty of the numbat! We received these beautiful images created by 35-year-old Afke van Herpt, an artist from the Netherlands.

"It all started with an online sketch festival, called Sketch Fest," says Afke from her home in the Netherlands. "People from all over the world give each other prompts of topics to draw. One of those prompts said "numbat" so I googled it – and then I discovered this little cute creature!"

Afke loves nature, and has been making drawings of other animals, too. But when she discovered the numbat, she was immediately drawn by its "artistic fur". "I also love the way they move, like skittish birds."

Pictures are all Afke has to base her work on. "I have never seen a numbat in real life. We don't have them over here in the zoo, let alone in the wild!"

When Afke discovered numbats are an endangered species, she felt it was her duty to draw attention to their plight with her art work. "Everyone who sees my numbats for the first time, asks me for more information. When no one knows anything about them, it is impossible to help. I don't have the money to support conservation projects, but I can help raise awareness by drawing them."



Baby Numbats Growing Up Fast



Baby numbats first emerge from their burrow in early September. They are very cautious and tend to remain still around the entrance taking in the sounds, sights and enjoying the warmth of the sun. Their cute faces and stubby noses accommodate feeding from their mother's milk when she returns every evening. As their confidence grows they venture beyond the burrow for short periods, they climb logs and on occasions claw at the logs and dig holes in the soil as they test their termite tracking skills.

By mid October they are more independent and readily venture out for the whole day. Their nose

is visibly longer to probe into the soil and rotted timber where they feed on termites.

They return each evening to their burrow and sometimes even get a free ride by hopping on mums back. By late October, mum and the babies don't always return each evening as they start to find their own logs or burrows to sleep in. This becomes more the case as they get older and start to disperse and find their own territories especially in November. For this reason November is the best time to see numbats and we can only hope that their adventures are safe and free from foxes and feral cats.


